



# Welcome to our May Newsletter 2024

### **Rector's Pastoral Letter**

As some of you might already know, this year of 2024 is rather a special year for Abington. It is the 800<sup>th</sup> anniversary since the first Rector of Abington. This gave me an opportunity to dig up some old documents and find interesting facts and stories about our history.

So here is a little bit of history for you. We think the church is probably older than 800 years. Probably around 900 years. The oldest part of the church building is the lower stage of the Tower and South doorway which approximately goes back to 1170s<sup>1</sup>. We can't know the exact



date because unfortunately the church doesn't appear in the Entry of Domesday Book although the name 'Abingtone' does appear in it.

The top right picture is the original folios of Domesday Book, a complete survey of England written in AD 1086. It shows records of "Bedford, O households, Leighton, 126 households, Luton, 145 households".<sup>2</sup>

However the earliest record that we can find about the church is when Peter de Irencestria (Peter of Irchester) was presented by Isabel de Lisors, Lady of the Manor and the widow of William, the great-grandson of Richard Engaine, a Norman Knight, by whom the estate of Abington had been held<sup>3</sup>.

Peter of Irchester was presented to the Bishop Hugh of Lincoln and this was recorded in the Rolls of Bishop Hugh of Lincoln (1209-1235)<sup>4</sup>. Apparently, this is the earliest known episcopal record. No other diocese is known to possess any earlier continuous series of Bishop's registers, except those of the See of York which are said to commence in 1214.

After Peter, there followed 55 Rectors, including myself which gives me the privilege of being the 56th Rector of Abington.


More will come when we update and republish our booklet about the church's history which

currently Jane is working on and we look forward to the day when Jane can present this work to the congregation in the future. Prester is also doing further research on previous Rectors and we hope to organise a talk about this subject later this year.

Although it is the 800th anniversary since the first Rector of Abington, the message and the story of it is, perhaps, much larger than the story of Peter of Irchester. It is much larger than the stories of all 56 Rectors. It is a collective

This will, hopefully, be revealed to us a bit more clearly through the sermon series that we are planning to mark this 800th anniversary. We will also explore this through the vision exercise: Under the Oak which will be led by Bishop Andrew. May I encourage you all to take part in this please?

# **Butterflies for 800th Anniversary**



What better way to celebrate our 800 year anniversary, than by celebrating the diversity and vibrancy of our church and community with a display of beautiful butterflies, each one as unique as we are.

It's really appropriate that we are launching our project on Easter Sunday, the day we remember Jesus' marvellous resurrection and naturally think of rebirth, as butterflies are one of very few creatures that can completely transform into something completely different.

As we look at the intricate and beautiful designs of each butterfly we are reminded of the marvel of God's creation. The incredible transformation from caterpillar to butterfly is like our own spiritual journey. We leave our old selves behind as we are transformed through our faith In Christ, growing spiritually just as a butterfly leaves its cocoon and takes flight into the world.

Our vision is to cover the front of the balcony with a fabulous display of butterflies. That's where we need you!

We want everyone (and we do mean everyone) to take part in this project by creating a butterfly. There are some examples on the pillar at the back of the church to give you some ideas, but you can create and decorate your butterfly however you want. As a guide we suggest anything up to A5 size, (or about half an A4 piece of paper).

There are some paper butterflies in the box at the back of the church in different sizes and different colours for you to decorate. Please take one, or feel free to create your own. Please also take one for friends and family to take part too. Our linked primary schools are going to be creating butterflies as are little fishes, our messy vintage group, junior church and hopefully more groups as our project continues. Ultimately we hope to have a truly fabulous display representing our whole community.

Once completed, please place butterflies in the box in the Welcomers' corner. Then over the next few months we will start to build up the display on the front of the balcony. Hopefully by the time of our patronal festival at the end of June we will have over 800 butterflies. And if we manage to completely cover the balcony then you may start to see butterflies appearing in other places in the church...

One final point, we are hoping to have hundreds and hundreds of butterflies so please understand that we cannot return butterflies.
