Easter Message by the Revd. Tracy Pegram (Curate)

Easter morning – a morning of extraordinary revelation – a morning of light, a morning of rejoicing!

Our Lenten journey of reflection and self-examination, preparing ourselves, is ended. We have journeyed through Holy week, and have now arrived at what is the most magnificent day in the life of the church.

And it centres around the empty tomb. The tomb at which, a few days ago, Mary, the disciples and Jesus' followers watched as Jesus' body was wrapped in linen grave clothes and placed inside.

Not that long ago, we were here talking about Jesus' birth. When he was wrapped in bands of cloth, and laid in a manger. We thought then of what Jesus' birth said about God. God with us, born into this world as a lowly, vulnerable baby – not born into wealth and power with the trappings of

earthly royalty, but born as a servant king. Pointing us to a God who does not overpower, coerce or rule through fear, but a God who loves, invites and participates in our reality with us.

We have heard, over the intervening weeks, of Jesus' teaching – how he lived, how he healed, how he demonstrated loving one another; and we heard about what the kingdom of God is like. Not just lovely stories, but insights into who God is, how God is, and who we are to God.

And, over this last week, we have travelled with Jesus, from his triumphant arrival into Jerusalem – heralded as the Messiah – the one people had been waiting so long for, the one who was to restore God's people to their rightful place – restoring their place in the world, and restoring their relationship with God. And yet, how things turned about. Within a week, Jesus is humiliated, beaten, and despite being found guilty of no crime, hung on a cross and left to die.

And now, this morning, we find the tomb in which he was laid is empty.

Where has Jesus gone? Let us pause for a moment with Mary, Simon Peter and the nameless disciple whom Jesus loves.

The disciples had scattered, one had betrayed Jesus, playing a critical role in his arrest and death, another, Simon Peter, had repeatedly denied knowing Jesus in spite of being warned he would do just that. Mary Magdalene had not long ago shown her love for Jesus, and now she is in the depths of grief.

When we look back over the gospel accounts, we see Jesus preparing the disciples for these events, foretelling his death, foretelling his resurrection, and showing them where the scriptures foretold these things too. And as we look on, we might ask how do they not get it? But then, do we really get it?

People don't just rise from the dead – usually. In the Old Testament we find an account of Elijah -the prophet asking God to restore the life of Zarephath's son (1 Kings 17:17-24), and the prophet Elisha praying over the son of the Shunammite woman, with success. (2 Kings 4:18-37) We even find a dead man being restored to life after he is placed in Elisha's tomb (2 Kings 13:20-21). But these accounts of bringing the dead to life are extraordinary, and they show the power that God clearly has over death, and demonstrate the righteousness of his appointed prophets.

In the New Testament, we see Jesus restoring the life of the widow of Nain's son (Luke 7:11-17) and raising Jarius' daughter to life (Luke 8:49-56), and we cannot forget the moving account of Jesus raising his friend Lazarus from the dead (John 11:38-44). You might recall that when Jesus arrived, Lazarus had

been in the tomb for four days. Jesus was greatly distressed at the death of his friend, but in a revelation of who he was said "I am the resurrection and the life, whoever believes in me, even though they die will live." (John 11:25) Jesus commands Lazarus to come out of his tomb, and out he comes, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth and his face covered. Jesus commands that he be unbound and let go.

So we know that Jesus too has the ability to raise people from the dead, just like the prophets – but let's look closely and we will see that the empty tomb reveals to us a profound truth about who Jesus is.

Notice that in our reading today, the writer of John's gospel goes to great lengths to draw our attention to what the disciples see when they first arrive at the tomb.

The disciple whom Jesus loves outruns Peter and arrives at the tomb first. "He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself." (John 20:5-7)

In every other resurrection story, from Zarephath's son to Lazarus, someone else was involved. Elijah, Elisha, Jesus – someone other than the dead person prayed, interceded, implored God to show mercy. But here, there is no-one. No prophet needed. Jesus was alone in that tomb. He didn't need someone else to tell him to come out, he wasn't still bound by his grave clothes needing to be unwrapped. The linen wrappings lie there, Jesus acted alone.

This difference is immense, because it shows the disciples, the authorities, the world, and us, that Jesus doesn't just resurrect – Jarius' daughter, the widow's son, his friend Lazarus – he **IS** the resurrection. In Jesus himself, death is overcome, the bindings of the grave are loosed and within Jesus himself is the resurrection.

And this is huge for us – because this is what Jesus has been talking about – over and over again. "I am the resurrection and the life" Jesus says – and here, in the empty tomb – Jesus does. "Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live."

God, the Father, Son and Spirit, the three in one who we marvel at as we mark the incarnation at the birth of Jesus, God who draws us to himself within the humanity of Jesus – Jesus who is born, lives and dies, a human life of vulnerability, struggle, pain and hardship, takes us in his humanity, through the grave to resurrection. "Everyone who lives and believe in me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:26)

This is hard to understand, hard to communicate, and that's because it is massive. The breadth and depth of God's love for us has been shown in Jesus – born for us, living for us, dying for us, rising for us. And I think that God shows that he knows this is hard for us to understand. As Jesus leaves the grave clothes behind and steps from the tomb, he shows that he IS the resurrection, and through appearing to Mary and his disciples he demonstrates the reality of that resurrection – they can see him, they hear that familiar voice, they see the familiar acts, they receive Jesus' care and compassion for them in their confusion.

If you find this difficult to understand, or even to believe, please know that you're not alone. Even the disciples had problems believing until they saw. But believing is the point, and when we find that belief we find ourselves resting in Jesus, resting in that incredible promise:

"I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die."

Amen.


